

THE PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Corinthians 15:58 Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain.

One of my favorite heroes of the faith is a man known as "the father of modern missions." William Carey was born into a poor family of weavers in 1761. Having a zeal for the Christian faith, Carey began to serve first as a part-time pastor at age 24. Then, after reading of the exploits of American missionaries David Brainerd and Jonathan Edwards, Carey published his own missionary manifesto. Soon thereafter at age 31, Carey began raising funds to travel to India as a pioneer missionary. It was a momentous undertaking and when his father heard the news, he pointed out that William had no academic qualifications for the job. Carey answered, "I can plod."

And plod he did! This was his typical day:

- 5:45 Devotions and reading a chapter in the Hebrew Bible
- 7:00 Led family prayers in Bengali, read Scripture in Hindustani
- 9:00 Translated Sanskrit into English
- 10:00 Went to college to teach until 2PM
- 2:00 Translated into Bengali until early supper
- 5:00 Translated Sanskrit until he preached to an English congregation at 7:30PM
- 9:00 Translated for 2 hours
- 11:00 Wrote a friend in England and read a chapter of the Greek New Testament

What a prodigious work schedule! Along the way William Carey founded the Serampore College and University – the first-degree awarding university in India. Carey is credited in doing more than anyone else in taking the message of Christ to India and establishing the church there. And he did it because he was a plodder!

Also, as of late you've probably heard the name of Charlie Kirk because of his recent assassination being all over the news. Charlie started Turning Point — a mission to the youth of our nation. Twelve years ago, he began out of his garage in the Chicago area and now there are thousands of local chapters. Like William Carey, he too was a plodder who began his day at 5:00AM and ended at 11:00PM. Charlie traveled over 200 days each year while building up a dedicated staff to carry out his work.

I share these examples with you in reaction to the easy beliefism of today that demands and asks nothing of Christ followers. In II Timothy 2 St. Paul calls believers to have the 24/7 dedication of a soldier of Christ, the discipline of an athletic team motivated to give all to achieve victory, and a hard-working farmer holding out for the promise of a beautiful harvest.

Again, isn't this in sharp contrast to the country club Christianity practiced by many where you pay your dues and come and go as you please?

Also, do know that through sharing the stories of William Carey and Charlie Kirk, it's not that I want you to emulate their moral standards or work ethic but instead that you would be most moved by observing the power of God's grace upon their lives. Indeed, it's ultimately this amazing grace of God that we too have experienced personally which motivates our pilgrimage toward our final destination in heaven. With fellow saints we plod as individuals and as a church. We are members of Christ's body and I urge you to pray that the Spirit would enable you to more fully find your niche that enables you to use your God-given gifts for the work of the Kingdom.

Perhaps at St. Paul's may there be future plodding as a church united through pursuing something like conducting a Vacation Bible School next year. It would be a challenging work of faith that involves stepping out one foot after another. May you be so moved with a faith inspired by William Carey's motto:

Expect great things from God Attempt great things for God.

Yes, many VBS fliers, as illustrated by Jesus' parable of the Sower of the Seed will fall on hard ground, but trust that some will fall into the hands of those receptive to God's Word and will. Yet, whatever you do regarding future endeavors know that it's a win/win situation and God will work a blessing through it that opens the way to further mission efforts.

Here's a great promise from St. Paul in Galatians 6:9:

Let us not grow weary while doing good for in due time we will reap if we do not lose heart.

What's the bottom line? Pilgrim, keep plodding on and you will succeed. With God all things are possible,.

MESSAGE FROM SANDY BARRY, OUR ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

Well, HELLO OCTOBER! Don't you just love how autumn bursts into full swing with its vibrant colors, crisp temperatures, and puts you in the mood for a cup of hot apple cider and fresh baked cinnamon rolls? It's the peak month for meteor showers, a great time to stargaze and pick out your favorite constellations in the sky, and it's also a time to view the Full Harvest Supermoon, which is bigger and brighter than usual and will arrive on October 6th. It hangs low and large on the horizon and is such a beautiful sight!

I'm a sports nut and just have to share this information with you. Did you know that the last two to three weeks in October (and, occasionally, the first week of November) are normally the only time of the year during which ALL of the "Big Four" major professional sports leagues play games? The National Basketball Association begins preseason games. Two weeks later, the regular season of the National Hockey League kicks off. The National Football League is already halfway through their regular seasons and the Major League Baseball League is in its postseason with the Championship Series and World Series games on the horizon. Wow! This is known as a sports equinox! Isn't that fascinating? Football games are just beginning and I'm already looking forward to the Super Bowl!

Here's my recent recovery update. As you know, I've been weaning off immunosuppressants. The successful tapering off of these powerful drugs is another significant milestone and a time for me to celebrate health and stability! I still have a little ways to go before I'm off immunosuppressants completely, but I'm making progress. It's incredible how my energy has improved!

My medical team is working on a schedule to revaccinate me and keep me safe at the same time, especially since it's cold and flu season. Because of the complexities of transplant revaccination and until my body has a chance to build immunities against infection and diseases, I need to avoid contact with anyone who has recently received live vaccines as they can cause infections in transplant patients. I'm fascinated with all the science involved in this procedure. It's complicated!! But, ... I know I'm in good hands.

Cataract surgery for my left eye has been set for October 14th. As I mentioned in last month's newsletter, removing cataracts for transplant patients comes with the risk of developing GVHD of the eyes. The specialist performing the surgery is well-versed in treating GVHD of the eyes, so if I develop it during recovery, she knows how to help me and treat the condition. Once my left eye has healed, surgery for my right eye will be scheduled. My ACTUAL birthday is next month and it would be the best birthday present to see God's creation through clear lenses once again. Please pray with me for the best outcome.

It has been a long year and seven months dear friends, and after all this time, you have been with me and for me, just like Jesus. Thank you so very much for your continued support, love, and prayers. I'm still receiving cards, gifts of love, emails, and phone calls that touch my heart, encourage, uplift, and inspire me. You have no idea what all this means to me. There are simply no words to express my deepest appreciation. I am humbled and overwhelmed by your kindness and generosities. I can only offer my sincere and heartfelt thanks. May the love of our Savior, Jesus Christ, surround you and bless you all the days of your life.

MESSAGE FROM OPERATION BARNABAS

The 9th Veterans Luncheon is over! There were 150 participants of which there were 10 disabled veterans from the Manteno Veterans Home. The Scout Troop #668 from St. Mark Lutheran church, Worth, greeted the Veterans as they came in. They worked serving the food, helping veterans carry their trays to their tables, and finally took down the tables and chairs.

The event started with the colors being presented by the Oak Lawn VFW Post 5220. A member of the Scouts led the saying of the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by the singing of the national anthem, led by Mandy (Barry) Signorelli. This was followed by a moment of remembrance with the playing of taps. The opening ceremony ended with the retirement of the colors followed by a short invocation.

Mandy presented several songs, which were very well received. Additional music was presented by DJ Mike. There was a presentation about doing visits to dying veterans in hospice care, and another on Honor Flight. We recognized Barbra Koning (a friend of Sue and John Lilja) who gave Operation Barnabas 9 handmade blankets, which we donated to the Veterans Home at Manteno.

After the meal, Mandy sang the Armed Forces Medley, and the veterans stood as she sang their service song. Then three of the Scouts read the 13 names of the American service men and women killed on August 26, 2021, in the ill-conceived and chaotic withdrawal from Afghanistan. A free raffle was held with 32 items given. The benediction was given and that closed the event.

The leftover food was boxed and offered to the veterans to take home. What was left was taken to the local Oak Lawn fire station who in turn gave part of it to a needy family of 13. The meal was catered by Kenootz Pizza and Catering in Midlothian.

MESSAGE FROM FAITH IN ACTION/SOCIAL MINISTRIES

It is a new season, FALL; and the thought of sharing overwhelms all of us as Thanksgiving draws near. Thanksgiving is around the corner, and we are already preparing our food pantry for the holiday bags in November. Martha Moeller, Mike & Debbie Will submitted a Thrivent grant to help cover these costs, so \$750 will be available to offset some of the cost of the Thanksgiving holiday bags. Thank you to our grant writers and also Thrivent for supporting our food pantry mission. If you also would like to help us with this project you can make a monetary donation to offset the cost of the turkey breasts and holiday items, or you can buy extra items that will be gifted in the holiday bags. A flyer is available in this newsletter and will also be available in the bulletin and flyers in the narthex. Also, we are always in need of fall items to warm the body as well: soups, stews, chili, or other meals-in-a-can are items we especially appreciate while the seasons change. We thank you ahead of time for your generosity.

We are so **THANKFUL** for our food pantry partners. In September, we received over 1733 pounds of groceries from our sponsors. We could not fill our bags without our food pantry rescue teams; Barb Rendemen with Panera, Brian Cottrell with Operation Blessing, Jayne Siou with "Put Your Hands Together" Immanuel, Hillside and Kathie Watts with Elmhurst-Yorkfield Food Pantry. Besides the produce and bread products, they support us with meat, dairy, & deli items, along with tortilla chips and Sparkling Ice beverage. They are constantly at our side with support. God has truly blessed us!

Many businesses are looking for an organization to serve during the holidays. If you know of a business that would like to organize a food drive for us during the holidays let us know, and we would be happy to contact them and share our information. Organizing a food pantry drop off space is easy to do, and we can provide the information and are willing to make the pick-up. Fliers about our food pantry are in the narthex.

Are you looking for a place to take your leftover Halloween candy? We would be happy to bag your candy and give it to our food pantry clients. They love sweet treats.

As of September 20th, 2025 we have harvested 573.25#'s of produce for our food pantry clients. That includes 473.5#'s from St. Paul while the OLCG has totaled 99.75#'s. These numbers are down from previous years; I believe, due to the extremely high temperature conditions we experienced this summer. We will still get some radishes and beets from a second planting plus some more tomatoes and peppers. The basil did extremely well this year and while Debbie was preparing bouquets for the clients we received many comments that the pantry smelled like an Italian deli. All in all though, the clients appreciate the fresh produce. The perennial garden still has many blooms and the butterflies are still visible. Thanks again to all the faithful waterers that make this possible! God is good!

Through you and our sponsors we have been blessed to serve those in need. The September food pantry served 78 families, 221 individuals. The September BEDS cook team cooked for 15 individuals. The meal included soy baked chicken legs w/ buttered noodles, green beans with a pecan topping, rolls, salad, milk, oranges, and Linda Fogarty's peach cobbler w/ ice cream. Thank you to the Board of Evangelism/Parish Education for the ice cream.




