


The Mission Statement of St. Paul Lutheran Church By God's grace, we exist to prepare hearts, minds, and souls for life in the world and in eternity.

THE PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Psalm 81:16 - "I would satisfy you with honey from the rock."

Over the years, my wife has babysat the children of a pastor in the area. The family attends a church which plays a lot of contemporary music, and 3-year-old Nathan began singing the words of a catchy tune that also caught my attention.

"There's honey in the rock Water in the stone Manna on the ground No matter where I go."

When I heard that, I'm thinking: Who wrote that? It's a mistake. Anyone with some basic Biblical knowledge can recognize the goofy error in this song. In Judges 14, Samson kills a lion with his bare hands. Later, returning to the spot, he discovered a swarm of bees had invaded the carcass. Finding honey inside, Samson then scooped some out to eat along the way.

That's the truth of the matter – honey from the lion not the rock! Yet, lo and behold, I had to eat some humble pie as I read those words from Psalm 81:

"But you would be fed with the finest of wheat; with honey from the rock I would satisfy you."

Hmm! What's this all about? For a little help in understanding, Psalm 81 was a call to revival as Asaph, the spiritual leader, reminded Israel of their past history as God's people. Though the Almighty delivered them from Egyptian bondage through miraculous acts, they failed God's tests of faithful obedience through rebellion and idolatrous acts and suffered because of it.

Yet, it was not God's will to punish them but instead, through being disciplined, they would experience the joy of obedience. He passionately pleads: "Open wide your mouth and I will fill it." You further sense God's cry of painful longing as He declares:

"If My people would but listen to Me, if Israel would follow My ways, how quickly I would subdue their enemies ... with honey from the rock I will satisfy you."

What is God trying to get across to them? If they would trust and obey their gracious Lord, instead of merely sustaining them with water from the rock (as in their desert wanderings), He would provide them with the satisfaction of honey from the rock. Though at first, such a phenomenon seems incredible, nevertheless, in ancient times bees would build hives in clefts of rocks which produced delicious wild honey.

Yet, I believe there is a great application of honey from the rock for us to consider. It's often in the rocky hard times of suffering that we grow spiritually. He gives us the best and brings sweetness out of what is harsh, forbidding and wholly unpromising. Out of one rock then another, he brings into our lives a sweetness that overwhelms the bitter. Don't we see this so graphically displayed in the cross as the ultimate example of triumph coming out of defeat – the honey of grace coming forth from Jesus the Rock of our salvation. God grant us wisdom to recognize how He uses even our troubles to reveal where true joy can be found. As the song goes, "There's honey in the rock – purpose in His plan!"

MESSAGE FROM SANDY BARRY, OUR ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

Dear Friends: It's that time of year when we embrace nature's changes and enjoy the changing colors of the leaves, the shorter days, and cooler temperatures. It's time to take advantage of hiking, apple picking, and visiting pumpkin patches. I typically like to decorate my home in all the warm colors of fall foliage, light scented candles, and play beautiful instrumentals, like Steven Pasero's, "Seasons". Fall is a time of abundance and harvest. When you think about it, we do have an abundance of everything, don't we? Our Lord promised He would provide, not all our wants, but all our needs, and He has been faithful in all our lives to do just that. Great is our God and most worthy to be praised!

In last month's newsletter, I told you I was being weaned off of immunosuppressants. I'm happy to report that there have been no complications and all has been going well. Once I'm off immunosuppressants, the next step in my recovery is revaccination and cataract surgery.

Revaccination means receiving childhood vaccinations all over again either to boost existing immunity or to establish new immunity and is done to strengthen the body's immune system to a specific virus or disease. I'm sure you remember vaccines for disease prevention like polio, measles, mumps, rubella, tetanus, pertussis, and chickenpox. Certain medical conditions like stem cell transplantation mandates revaccination to establish new immunities in our bodies. To do this safely, my medical team is reviewing my medical history, assessing my level of immunity, and recommending the best course of action to take to ensure my body's defenses against a particular disease remain strong and effective and I'll have adequate protection from viruses and diseases. I understand that multiple vaccinations can be safely administered at one time. I have no idea how long this process will take, but I have every confidence in my team that they know what they're doing and will continue to care for me in the excellent manner they have.

As we age, developing cataracts is common. It's like you're looking through a cloudy window. Chemotherapy induced cataracts are also common and are one of the most prevalent eye problems associated with chemotherapy. For most individuals, cataract surgery is a simple and uncomplicated process. However, the decision to remove cataracts after transplantation is risky. My medical stability and the timing of the procedure are key in determining if surgery is safe. Until my immune system is stronger, the risk for infection or ocular GVHD (graft-verses-host disease of the eyes) after surgery is possible. Symptoms of ocular GVHD include red bulging eyes, dryness, epiphora (an overflow of tears), photophobia (light sensitivity), and blurred vision. If you want to know what GVHD of the eye looks like, just google it. I meet for a consultation with my surgeon, who specializes in GVHD of the eyes, on September 19th. I ask that you keep us in your prayers. I have every confidence that the Lord will see me safely through each surgery!

This summer, I had a little setback. On July 8th, I received an infusion of Reclast, designed to build back bone that chemotherapy destroyed. Had I known the full effects of receiving Reclast, I never would have allowed the infusion and would have sought an alternative method of treatment. One of the side effects of this medication is that it could cause a hairline fracture or a break in the femur bone. It's rare, but it could happen. Well, after enduring pain, x-rays, and an MRI, it was discovered that I DO have a hairline fracture in the hip. Oh, yes, my friends, the fun continues!! I have an appointment with an oncology orthopedic on September 9th to discuss whether physical therapy can help. I understand a hairline fracture is like a broken toe. Not much can be done. I've been told not

to put any weight on my leg because if the fracture gets worse, I'll need a hip replacement!! I've been resting with my leg elevated since July. I have a cane, but Mike and Debbie Will brought two walkers from St. Paul for me to use which has been a huge help! One of the walkers has a seat which I absolutely love. Once again, I ask that you keep me in your prayers.

I love to watch the seasons change. One of the changes I love to see at this time of year happens with our sun. In the summer, the sun shines strong and bright from morning to night. In late August, the sun shines but instead of burning bright, it casts an amber-golden glow across the landscape. I call it my "September Sun" and find it absolutely beautiful. Have you noticed it? Yes, during every season, the sun changes. As Christians living out our lives in a sinful, fallen world, what a comfort it is for us to know the One Son who never changes. God's Son, Jesus Christ, our precious Lord, Savior, and Redeemer never changes. He is the same yesterday, today, and forever. (Hebrews 13:8). This verse is a comforting reminder that the character and faithfulness of Christ remains steadfast and constant, despite the changing seasons and circumstances of the world in which we live.

May we all seek to be as faithful to Him as He is to us. In Jesus' name. Amen.


